We must quickly carry out the tasks assigned us by the one who sent us." - John 9:3b-4

The first public ministry of Jesus was to overturn the tables of the money changers in the Jerusalem temple courts and claim they had turned God's house into a den of robbers. Then, Jesus heals a man on the Sabbath and tells him to pick up his mat and walk—again, in

the TEMPLE of all places! Not only did Jesus cause disruptions, he saw 'disruptions' as an opportunity to display the works of God. Later on in John 9, a man born blind comes into the synagogue where Jesus was teaching and at the behest of his Father he heals on the Sabbath (again), he preaches a message of repentance (which literally means to stop what you are doing and turn your life around 180 degrees).

"Disrupters" in today's business speak are people with new innovative ideas that 'disrupt' well established norms and institutions. If that's the case, Jesus was the disruptor in chief! We tend to focus negatively on disruptions in our lives, in our faith and in our churches. We want things to go smoothly and according to our plan and our expectations. Even though we may know better, habits that we form around our daily lives translate into a world where we are ultimately in control. When we aren't in control we are unhappy.

Another word I keep thinking about is gratitude. Thinking negatively about our lives and the disruptions we experience day to day is to be human, but it's not Christ-like. We can only invent a Jesus who "wanted things to go as planned," and made sure everything "went smoothly." The human paradox is that while negative thinking is the norm, no one questions the power of positive thinking. Health researchers tell us that gratitude and positive thinking have a significant effect on our mental and physical health. Studies tell us that people who practice gratitude exercise more, make fewer doctor visits, improve their relationships, are happier, and feel better about their lives. (Univ. of Miami, U. Penn, and others.) A recent Harvard Medicine article recommended and encouraged prayer and meditation as a way

to achieve gratitude.

Jesus didn't die so that we can engage in mere positive thinking however. Jesus isn't into self help or self talk. When Jesus shined a light on our dark world, he exposed a reality where our obsession for control becomes a silly exercise in futility. Jesus exposed our habits of self absorption and self will to be a sin against our loving creator. Jesus showed us that God regularly disrupts our habitual dependencies in order to train us

and transform us in the mysterious glory that is ours as sons and daughters of God.

The answer to frustration and negativity about the many disruptions in our lives is to "take on the mind of Christ." Maturing in Christ means to become thankful for the disruptions. It means that we should not just tolerate disruption, but wait and watch for God to work in it and through it. We may even get to the point where we depend on God so much that we depend on and ask Jesus to regularly disrupt our way of thinking, to speak a new word into us and lead us in the way of His Spirit. There are also disruptions that are not from God but rather from the evil one. But it is only through prayer with God that we begin to discern how to respond, how to "carry out the tasks of the one who sent us," and how to experience the joy and gratitude of the abundant life Jesus promises.

Prayer: Thank you Lord Jesus, that you disrupted our world and shattered our human expectations. Thank you Lord, that you are showing us a better way and revealing your grace and love for us. Thank you Lord, that the disruptions I face today can become an opportunity to give you the glory and praise you deserve. Amen.

Memories of First Baptist

I came to First Baptist in 1963 when I married Linwood Harris who was a member. Following are some memories and some events that shaped the life of my family and myself.

(1) Being baptized – I grew up in a Methodist Church and was baptized there. I was re-baptized in order to become a participating member of this congregation. It allowed me to begin teaching Sunday School to the children and families who began coming to First Baptist through the Bus Ministry that



and families who began coming to First Baptist through the Bus Ministry that began under the pastorate of Jim Pharr. I learned a lot teaching with Barbara Culler.

(2) Sunday School classes for young marrieds, first taught by Pat Pharr and later by Ruth Adams who taught the women and Bob Culler who taught the men. These classes introduced me to people who became my dear friends and welcomed me to an unknown group whose friendships I treasure still and miss so many who have passed away. I delighted in reconnecting with a high school friend, Jo Godfrey, who became a lifelong friend.

(3) The Agape Class where we enjoyed Sunday School classes as couples. We were in each other's homes, took trips and sold hotdogs at the annual High Point Christmas parade for several years, raising money to provide a Thanksgiving meal to members of the community. The friendships that started early flourished more as we enjoyed growths in our families and a true fellowship of Christian love.

(4) The birth of our children, Chip and Kelly, who were introduced to the church under the watchful eye of Helen Sheffield, Linda Marion Slate, Peggie Gillie and Jeanne Cooke. Lamar King baptized Chip and Kelly and Frank Smith encouraged and supported their participation in the youth activities as they matured into their pre-teen and teen years. Both Frank and Lamar were at the hospital when Kelly underwent serious eye surgery in Greensboro. Chip was able to attend the World Baptist Youth Conference in Scotland, a memorable experience for a young high school student. He returned with the realization that many who were there from other countries had a much more difficult time being allowed to come from their countries.

(5) Bill Slater officiated at the dedication of our granddaughter, Chip's daughter Cali, who was later baptized by Gay Gulick. Two months after the dedication, Dr. Slater officiated at the marriage of Kelly and Paul. He, like Jim Pharr also encouraged outreach to the community. Under his leadership a Bible Study was begun at The Sheraton Towers. I was one of many who came to know our neighbors across the street through Sunday morning Bible study. On the day after Christmas in 2023, Bill Slater spent the day with me at the bedside of Linwood who had become seriously ill overnight. He also picked up Kelly and Paul from the airport that evening. He offered to pick up Chip who would also be flying home but a friend wanted to get him.

(6) The outpouring of love and sympathy that were expressed to my family during the weeks of Linwood's hospital and Hospice care were like nothing I had ever seen. Church members, some of whom I didn't know, brought food, sent cards, and reached out with support. Family members still remember the meal that was provided at the church for the many family members who came from out of town.

(7) The music!!! How many sermons have I heard from the choir loft. Even though our family was not actively involved with the music ministry, Bruce Hartgrove, at my request, called members of the choir who came and sang at the funeral. On a happier note, Bruce also officiated at the marriage of Chip and Martha Ann.

8) The special friends with whom I continue to share time in Sunday School – different names, different faces, but the same Christian spirit that my family and I have witnessed for many years. In closing, I think a quote from Kelly on searching for a church home in Pittsburgh best sums up what First Baptist has meant to our family – "I wish I could move First Baptist to Pittsburgh."
